
SOUTHERN UTAH ART GUILD'S FEBRUARY 2025 EVENTS



A GENTLEMAN'S GUIDE TO LOVE AND MURDER COMES TO UTAH TECH THEATRE

Prepare for an evening of wit, charm, and unforgettable music as A Gentleman's Guide to Love and Murder takes the stage at Utah Tech! 

The final session will be presented by Shanandoah Anderson on February 25, exploring the history of the Shivwits Band of Paiutes.


"This lecture series is a great opportunity to learn more about Washington County's past, meet local history aficionados, and engage with the community," Cox said.

THE INDEPENDENT MOVIE REVIEW By Adam Mast

FLIGHT RISK (R) $\star^{\frac{1}{2}}$

"Flight Risk" represents a bit of turbulence for a director who was, up until this point, 5 for 5.

It gives me no such pleasure in saying this but, "Flight Risk" might be the worst movie by a legitimately great director that I've ever seen. Seriously, this was a disappointing experience of monumental proportions as up until this point, Mel Gibson was 5 for 5 as a director (see "The Man Without a Face," "Braveheart," "The Passion of the Christ," "Apocalypto," and "Hacksaw Ridge.) In fact, one could easily make the argument that Gibson is more gifted as a director than he is an actor and that's saying a lot because the man is one hell of an actor.



"Flight Risk" offers a simple enough premise; An Air Marshall (played by Michelle Dockery) and the fugitive (played by Topher Grace) she's transporting across the Alaskan Wilderness by way of a plane, soon discover that the pilot (Mark Wahlberg) that's guiding them isn't a pilot at all, but rather, a hitman whose been hired to off said fugitive before he can testify against an unforeseen enemy. What follows is a would-be thriller in which the Air Marshall and the hitman try to outwit each other in an unbelievably witless manner all while soaring a few thousand feet above the ground.

It pains me to even write this review as I'm not one for sharing negative thoughts in a public forum like this when it comes to my very favorite art form, most notably when it's by a filmmaker that I hold in such high regard. Alas, "Flight Risk" is a "real time" throwback to the more disposable-style thrillers of the 80s and 90s. This is to say that it isn't intense, adrenalin pumping, or well-executed enough to enjoy as a quintessential actioner (see "Speed" or "Narrow Margin") but at the same time, it isn't silly, over-the-top, or flat-out ridiculous enough to enjoy as a parody of such films, either (see "Loaded Weapon" or "Tango and Cash.") Instead, it's somewhere painfully in between.

Honestly, this one doesn't even really qualify as "so-bad-it's good" and this goes beyond the baffling character decisions, the bizarre tonal shifts, and the paint by numbers plot mechanics. Further still, if you enjoy a thriller that makes even the tiniest of concerted efforts to stay a step of the audience, then this movie definitely won't be for you.

The performances here don't do much to elevate the turbulence-filled proceedings. "Downton Abbey" star Dockery does pull off the American accent but beyond that, this is a wooden turn and I never bought her as the badass Air Marshall. Granted, it certainly is the character as written and directed so not all of the blame here can be put on her shoulders. As for Grace, he looks utterly bored. He has a few quips to speak of but there's isn't anything particularly engaging about him. Of the cast, Wahlberg fares best as his balding baddie does offer a handful of amusing, colorful, and sometimes disturbing moments. To Wahlberg's credit, he is wise to play up the camp factor throughout the majority of the movie. That

makes some of the proceedings at least somewhat tolerable.

It's simply stunning that Gibson even agreed to make this film as the entire time, it feels like he's playing down to the proceedings rather than rising up to his considerable skill sets as a storyteller. If you've seen Gibson's past work as a director (particularly "Apocalypto" and "Braveheart") then you know

that this is a man who understands the cinematic language of action and tension, neither of which this movie really offers. In fact, if this had been Gibson's first film as a director, there's a strong possibility that he would have had a difficult time getting gig number two, a fate that very well could befall screenwriter Jared Rosenberg.

It's hard to know for sure how much of "Flight Risk" was actually intentional and how much of it is simply misguided. That being said, there is one way I might consider watching it again; If I'm with a large group of friends and it makes an appearance on Mystery Science Theater. The operative word being "might." As for Gibson, I am forever a fan and admirer of his work and now that he's put this one behind him, I'm confident that he'll get back to business because my heart simply couldn't take a world where his long-indevelopment sequels for both "The Passion of the Christ" and "Lethal Weapon" end up in a budget bin with "Flight Risk."

SUNDANCE 2025: BEST OF FEST By Adam Mast

The 2025 Sundance Film Festival has officially come to a close and while I didn't get to take in as many films as I generally do, there was plenty to get excited about. Here's a look at my 5 favorite films from the recent independent film showcase;

TRAIN DREAMS

From writer/director Clint Bentley ("Jockey") comes this lyrical and often dreamlike look at Robert Grainer (beautifully played by Joel Edgerton), a soft-spoken, hard-working man of an early 1900s American West looking to navigate a world that is quickly changing around him. Bolstered by outstanding performances, breathtaking cinematography, authentic production design, and a stirring score, "Train Dreams" is a beautiful tribute of an average man in an extraordinary time and for all its accomplishments, it's a film that manages to remain hopeful even when it's lead character is challenged by emotionally devastating trials.

• DJ AHMET

In this irresistibly charming North Macedonian import, a Yurok teen from a small village finds himself drawn to house music in an area that frowns upon it. An awkward situation is made even more awkward when Ahmet eventually finds himself drawn to a teen girl who has already been promised to another man and as expected, this doesn't go over particularly well with her stern father. With its universal themes , "DJ Ahmet" is certainly familiar (the proceedings essentially play as a coming of age underdog story) but it's incredibly entertaining. The characters are endearing and the story of brotherly love at the center of the movie is sweet and moving Also, if you don't laugh at the brightly colored screaming sheep, you simply have no sense of humor. Yeah, "DJ Ahmet" is guite the lovable gem and I greatly look forward to revisiting it. TWINLESS

James Sweeney's dark comedy, "Twinless," puts an interesting spin on the traditional bromance movie. It's the kind of high concept stuff you might see in a sitcom but Sweeney subverts things in a way that will keep viewers on their toes. It's also a movie that isn't afraid to show its characters in a flawed light. At the heart of the film is Rocky (Dylan O'Brien,) a grieving man who spends much of his time at a twin loss support group after his brother passes away unexpectedly. While at this support group, Rocky meets Dennis (played by the film's writer and director), and before long, they're getting along famously. I'm treading lightly here so as to not spoil what's really on this movie's mind only to say that things get complicated. "Twinless" isn't without its flaws (the graphic sexual content is a bit much) but, it's well acted and puts an emphasis on character above all else. More importantly, though, it confirms something I've felt for over a decade; That Dylan O'Brien ("The Maze Runner,' "Love and Monsters," "Saturday Night") is one of our most underappreciated actors. This is quite a breakout role for him and that's something to be truly excited about.

• OMAHA

"Omaha" is a quiet, understated little road movie that opens with a broken single father (John Magaro) pulling his kids (Molly Belle Wright and Wyatt Solis) from bed, packing up the car, and hitting the open highway. Why they're leaving and where they're headed isn't entirely clear from the outset but what is clear is how much this man loves his children. This minimalist effort from director Cole Webley and screenwriter Robert Machoian is built up of tiny moments that are so authentic, so genuine, and so powerful (there's a moment with the family dog that positively wrecked me), that often, "Omaha" doesn't even really feel like a movie at all. It feels like a slice of real life. Yes, the proceedings tend to be a little mundane and even a bit repetitive but that's by design. Nothing feels stagey or rehearsed. What's more, the kids in this picture are absolute naturals but I suppose some of the credit for that has to go to Webley for creating an environment in which these kids are able to shine as brightly as they do. Also, big time props are to DP Paul Meyers for his beautiful cinematography. "Omaha" is positively gorgeous to look at. The only area I really felt this movie faltered is in the ending which I had a hard time buying into. Clearly, though, that's a case of personal taste. Regardless, what I loved most about "Omaha" is the journey and that's really what this restrained and emotionally charged road movie is all about.

• SLY LIVES! (THE BURDEN OF BLACK GENIUS)

I saw a handful of documentaries at Sundance this year (noteworthy docs about Jeff Buckley and Marlee Matlin among them) but of the lot, Sly Lives! was my favorite. This celebration of musical icon Sly Stone was directed by fellow musical icon Questlove. This tribute to a trailblazing genius is so joyful and so utterly in love with this artist and his unforgettable music that by the time the end credits roll, you'll want to run out and buy every record this man had anything to do with. Questlove affectionately traces Stone's decades-spanning career and even takes a little time to touch on some of the icons he influenced. Included; Prince and Janet Jackson. Not surprisingly, "Sly Lives!" also delves into some of the darker aspects of the industry and success in general, but again, this is mostly a celebration of Sly and his epic catalogue of songs. So much joy was on display, in fact, that the sold out crowd at Sundance's Eccles Theater (which holds a whopping 1200 people) found plenty of time to groove in their seats, sing along, and cheer following the film's many dynamic live performance sequences. "Sly Lives! (The Burden of Black Genius)" will make its debut on Hulu in mid-February. Be sure to check it out!


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Safety Tips For Zion

Emergencies

For 24-hour emergency response, call 911 or (435) 772-3322. The Zion Canyon Medical Clinic is located in Springdale near the south entrance to the park. For hours, please call (435) 772-3226. Other medical clinics are located in Hurricane. The nearest hospitals are in St. George, Cedar City, and Kanab.

Hydrate and use refillable water bottles

It is easy to get dehydrated while hiking and walking in the desert, so pack along extra water, and be sure to take rest and water breaks on long hikes.

There are a number of places to refill your water bottles in Zion National Park

including the visitors' center and Zion Lodge as well as a new hydration station at the Springdale bus stop in front of The Bumbleberry Inn and Zion Canyon Brew Pub.

Be cautious near steep cliffs

Falls from cliffs on trails can result in death. Loose sand or pebbles on stone are very slippery. Be careful of edges when using cameras or binoculars. Never throw or roll rocks because there may be hikers below you. Stay on the trail. Stay back from cliff edges. Observe posted warnings. Please watch children.

Watch for flash floods

All narrow canyons are potentially hazardous. Flash floods, often caused by storms miles away, are a real danger and can be life threatening. You are assuming a risk when entering a narrow canyon. Your safety is your responsibility.

Tips To Minimize Your Impact

Pack it in, pack it out & use recycling bins

Each month, Zion National Park pays many thousands of dollars to haul away waste collected from garbage cans and recycling bins. Your experience and that of everyone who visits Zion Canyon can be improved by never littering and making sure you pick up any trash you see along the way. Recycling bins are placed strategically throughout Zion Park, and it is highly encouraged for everyone to use them.



Please stay on the marked trails

Hiking off trails can lead to loss of vegetation, soil compaction, erosion, and unsightly scars on the landscape. Remember, if you bring it in, please pack it out.

Go before you go

It is always a good idea to use the restroom before you begin a hike since facilities are limited to select locations. If you do need to take care of your business, please pack it back out. Be respectful to the wildlife

Feeding, harming, or capturing wild animals is illegal and can cause injury or death to the animal. Animals can become aggressive beggars when fed.

Please leave it how you found it

It is illegal to remove anything from Zion National Park, including flowers, rocks, or anything else that you might find. Do not write or carve on natural surfaces.

Spend a day in Springdale

Springdale is unique to our national park system in that it is almost completely surrounded by Zion National Park. So when you're in Springdale, you're right in the middle of Zion Canyon.

Catch an event

Consider getting up extra early or trekking out midday after the initial rush has flooded in.


Consider coming back again in the low season

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

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BLOOMINGTON'S PETROGLYPH PARK By Tom Garrison

Location: Petroglyph Park in Bloomington, a part of St. George

Difficulty: Easy with no strenuous sections.

Average Hiking Time: Less than 1/2 hour at a leisurely pace.

Elevations: Approximately 2,490 feet trailhead elevation with no discernable elevation change.

Family Friendly: Yes.

Getting There: From St. George, go south on Interstate 15 to the Brigham Road exit (exit 4). Follow the exit ramp to a traffic circle, go halfway around the circle, and exit onto Pioneer Road going south. Approximately .6 mile from the traffic circle, turn right (west) onto Man O War Road. This road crosses the Virgin River, and after .7 mile from the Pioneer Road turnoff, turn left (south) onto Bloomington Drive. Bloomington Drive winds through the neighborhood, and 1.3 miles from the Man O War turnoff, turn left (west) onto Navajo Drive, with Bloomington's Petroglyph Park being .1 mile ahead on the right. (The park's address is 1460 West Navajo Drive, St. George.) Be aware that parking is scarce, you must park alongside the road. There are no curbs or gutters, let alone a parking lot.

It's mid-winter, blustery and cold, what



to do? You're tired of being housebound. You could go on a nice five-mile hike and freeze. Or, how about a quick adventure, 30 minutes or so, to an urban petroglyph site?

Who likes ancient rock art (petroglyphs)? Just about everyone. Southwest Utah has many petroglyph sites, and my wife, Deb, and I have explored several of them. Recently, I found a new site nestled in the Bloomington area of St. George— Bloomington's Petroglyph Park. This small (about $\frac{1}{2}$ acre) rustic park features two gigantic boulders covered with petroglyphs. Ancient rock art is surrounded by suburbia near the base of Bloomington Hill.

Bloomington's Petroglyph Park is a small park meant to preserve the petroglyphs in the middle of an ordinary neighborhood. Native Americans visited and likely settled in the Bloomington area long before 1870. The rock art they left behind is evidence of their activity.

Deb and I began our expedition to Bloomington's Petroglyph Park on a cold Saturday morning in mid-January, which happened to be my birthday. Be aware that parking is scarce, you must park alongside the road. There are no curbs or gutters, let alone a parking lot.

We parked alongside the park at about 10:30 am with the temperature in the mid-40s and of course, a cold wind under a deep blue Utah sky. The trailhead elevation is 2,4901 feet with no discernable elevation change.

This historic site is a non-renewable cultural resource, so please follow some simple rules: Do not touch, alter, or damage the petroglyphs and stay on the trails; don't trample the native vegetation.

The park has some native vegetation and two benches to rest from all the walking. We strolled around the park's perimeter, about 1/10 mile, checking all boulders for glyphs. It seems as if all the petroglyphs are concentrated on two huge rocks in the center of the park. We found many different carvings-human and animal forms, squiggly lines, and circles. Some petroglyphs are wearing off due to the ravages of time, but most remain clearly visible. Be sure to check high and low and the backsides as the glyphs are on all sides of the boulders. Don't overlook a glance to the northwest, a prominent landmark, Bloomington Hill, dominates that view.

The same thought always occurs to us when we examine petroglyphs—what do they mean? Over the years, I've done considerable research into the meaning of Native American petroglyphs, and all experts agree—no one really knows.

A National Park Service article (2023) on reading rock markings says:

These include abstractions like spirals, dots, geometric patterns, or more recognizable forms like animals, humans, and handprints. Whatever they represent, these curious figures provoke within many people the desire to understand. ... Though we may not understand them, they often inspire within us a sense of awe and wonder.

Whatever they mean, it is always a treat to find and examine them.

After wandering and examining petroglyphs for about 30 minutes, we ended this short adventure. Being mid-winter and cold, we were the only people in the park. If you want to explore a small area with many petroglyphs in a short time, consider visiting Bloomington's Petroglyph Park.

ICE AGE FOX FOUND IN CAVE IN UINTA MOUNTAINS OF UTAH

A nearly complete skeleton of a 26,000-year-old red fox was collected from deep in Whiterocks Cave. It is the most complete Ice Age mammal found in north-eastern Utah.

A team of scientists from the Utah Division of State Parks and the USDA Forest Service Ashley National Forest, along with a group of Utah cavers, have recovered the nearly complete skeleton of a red fox dating back to the Ice Ages in a cave in the Uinta Mountains of northeastern Utah.

A radiocarbon age on one of the bones from several years ago indicated that the fox skeleton is approximately 26,000 years old, dating from just before the last glacial maximum during the Ice Ages. This means that the skeleton had already been lying in the cave for more than 10,000 years when humans first started farming founder crops and for more than 20,000 years when the Giza pyramids were built.

Red foxes (Vulpes vulpes) are the most widely distributed terrestrial carnivores in the world. They appeared in North America from Eurasia between 300,000 and 130,000 years ago. For much of their history here, they have been distributed primarily in western and northern North America.

"It was a gorgeous specimen," said the Utah Field House of Natural History State Park Museum's John Foster, who was the project's lead organizer. "Almost the entire animal lying where it had been for so long, nearly every bone intact and well preserved. We don't often see specimens like that."

The nearly complete skeleton, nicknamed "Roxy," was found partially articulated and lying on its left side in a less accessible part of the cave's back. The name was chosen following a poll at the museum.

To find such a skeleton in a setting like a wet cave, with all the typical formations like "cave bacon," was unexpected as well, Foster said.

"This specimen is one of the oldest directly dated records of the red fox species," said Ice Age mammal expert Greg McDonald, a retired National Park Service paleontologist. "The first in Utah, but among the oldest in North America."

No one on the team is entirely sure how the fox got so far back in that part of the cave. In fact, they have differing opinions on how it may have happened. Of course, there is no way to know for sure, either.

"Perhaps the most common question is how the red fox got nearly half a mile into the back of the cave in complete darkness," said Ashley National Forest geologist David Herron, who helped plan and lead the expedition.

The fox skeleton was found several years ago but was never collected due to the difficulty in getting fragile bones out of the cave and down a mountain. After additional planning efforts, the team decided to go in this past summer.

Roxy the fox was collected from Whiterocks Cave in the Uinta Mountains at about 8,600 feet elevation. Because of the difficult access and conditions involving mud, crawling, and climbing, the team brought specially made plastic tubes for packing and getting bones out undamaged. Before any bones were removed, the skeleton was lit and photo-documented, another task that required hiking a lot of equipment up to and through the cave.



"Getting the supplies and gear through the cave to the canid proved to be a challenge, and getting back out with the skeleton went only a little smoother," Foster said. "We were in the cave for about six hours."

The entire expedition took the team of nine nearly 16 hours to complete.

Before the discovery of Roxy, the red fox skeleton, few Ice Age mammals had been found in northeastern Utah — one of those being the shin bone of a camel found in the 1980s south of Vernal. The nearly complete red fox skeleton is thus one of the most significant finds of an Ice Age animal in the region.

When the initial tests are finished, and the bones are fully cleaned and stabilized, some of Roxy's bones will be displayed at the Utah Field House of Natural History State Park Museum in Vernal, Utah.

"Roxy has finally seen the light of day again after 26,000 years in total darkness," Foster said. "We look forward to sharing her with visitors soon."



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VOLUNTEERS COMPLETE NEARLY 1,500 DWR PROJECTS IN 2024

2024 was a banner year for volunteers helping benefit wildlife in Utah, with volunteers in the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources Dedicated Hunter Program completing 1,473 projects — more than double the number of projects completed the year before.

The Dedicated Hunter Program is a service-based hunting program that allows participants to have more time to hunt deer each year. In 2024, 8,792 people participat-



ed in the program. Participants must complete 32 hours of DWR-approved service (or pay for their hours) to qualify for deer permits through the program. They enroll in the program for a three-year period and can harvest two deer during that period if they meet the service requirements.

"The Dedicated Hunter program is designed to provide opportunities for hunters and the DWR to work together as partners to improve wildlife habitat, increase hunting and angling opportunities and support all forms of wildlife recreation in Utah," DWR Dedicated Hunter Coordinator Bryan Christensen said. "Dedicated Hunters contribute thousands of hours of service each year and accomplish an incredible amount of work that benefits wildlife, which would otherwise not happen at this scale."

Last year, the participants in this important program completed a total of 45,549 volunteer hours toward fish and wildlife-related projects. They also provided the equivalent of \$181,600 in equipment and materials for project use.

"We are grateful for these passionate hunters who give back to wildlife through their service in this program," Christensen said. "These important projects truly make a difference for wildlife and conservation in Utah."

The projects completed by Dedicated Hunter volunteers last year included:

Improving habitat for wildlife (includ-



ing planting seeds and shrubs, removing trash from wildlife management areas, and removing noxious weeds).

• Helping install guzzlers, which are large devices that catch and store water from snow and rain to provide drinking water for wildlife during dry years.

• Assisting with wildlife monitoring (including helping biologists with wildlife population surveys, fish gillnetting surveys and bird banding projects to help track their migrations).

• Teaching hunting and fishing to others

• Helping with wildlife recreation events

• Helping maintain and repair state facilities

Northgate Peaks

The Northgate Peaks trail in the Kolob Terrace section of Zion National Park is an amazing trail with spectacular views. The trail itself is nearly flat, making it a perfect hike for families.

To reach the Northgate Peaks trailhead, take State Route 9 to the town of Virgin. Turn left onto Kolob Terrace Road. Drive for 15.7 miles through increasingly spectacular country until the short spur road (on the right) for the Wildcat Trailhead is reached. Drive a few hundred feet to the large parking area.

The trail heads east across grassy plains and stands of Ponderosa Pine with dynamite views of the towering Pine Valley Peak to the west. Soon the trail will be fully in the forest with limited views. After 0.9 miles, the junction with the Hop Valley trail is reached. Continue east, and 0.1 miles further, the junction with the Northgate Peaks Trail is reached. Head south on this trail for another 1.1 miles until the end of the official trail is reached at a rocky basalt bluff with epic views of the Northgate Peaks to the east and west and of North Guardian Angel to the south.

For families with young children, this makes an excellent turnaround spot.

Gifford Canyon

Gifford Canyon offers a nice stroll through a sandy wash and is very charming when water is running. This hike is nearly 3 miles long and will take about 2 hours to finish.



To start this hike, park in the lot located immediately east of the Zion/Mt. Carmel Tunnel. The trail begins at the backside of the restrooms at the back of the parking lot. There will be a steep, sandy path to climb down before you enter Pine Creek slot. Follow the path upstream for almost 75 feet, and look for a 15-foot wall of slickrock. You can scramble up the rock or look for the beaten path on the backside of the rock.

On top of this wall is a narrow dirt path that is crowded by rock and vegetation. It winds around the mountain to a dead end with a beautiful view of the mountain where the Canyon Overlook Trail is located, opposite is Gifford Canyon.

The path will lead past stone bridge and to another minor slickrock climb. At the end of the canyon, there is a circle of cliffs preventing further exploration without climbing up the sandstone.

Chinle Trail

Chinle Trail is an off-the-beaten-path trail located in the lower elevation west desert wilderness area, offering wide vistas, desert landscapes, and a reprieve from the more touristy trails in the park. Though it's a long trail, it's a mellow hike that can be cut off whenever you feel like turning around. It's a great hike with kids because it's not treacherous, slippery, or steep. Avoid it after snow or rain as it will be muddy. The Chinle Trailhead starts outside of Zion, south of Springdale. If you are coming from St. George, the turn is about a block before you hit the apple orchard and stand as you leave Rockville off of State Route 9. There is a parking area off the right of Anasazi Way near the Anasazi Plateau housing development. If you hit houses, you missed it. And yes, the trail starts below the housing development and takes you right through it. Don't worry though, it doesn't last long.

Shortly after you get through the housing development, you will hit a sign letting you know you are entering the Zion Wilderness. At this point, you can breathe a sigh of relief, because you have gotten away from civilization to enjoy nature, and chances are that you won't see another soul until you return to your car.

Many Pools

The route is moderate with a gentle uphill climb to an alcove, but plan for a strenuous hike if you continue to the East Rim.

The route begins right off the highway. Drive to the pullout near the second drainage on the north side of the State Route 9, about 0.8 miles after the smaller tunnel. Walk carefully along the road about 150 yards and drop down into a sandy bowl on the north side of SR-9. There is a trail for a short distance, and then the sand turns into large flat stones that you can pick and choose to walk on, depending on your sense of balance. A short distance off the road, filled pools carved into the rocks appear. Ponderosa Pines and Juniper trees twisted by the wind are a good backdrop to the reds and whites ribboned through the rocks.

Overlook Trail

The Overlook Trail is a short, beautiful hike located on the east side of Zion National Park, just outside the Mt. Carmel tunnel. The hike is about one mile roundtrip, and it usually takes people about an hour. It is definitely one of the easier hikes in Zion, but it's still considered a moderatelevel hike due to a few exposed areas and sandstone pathways, which can be slippery.

The Overlook trailhead lies right outside of the Mt. Carmel tunnel by the ranger booth. Exit the tunnel too quickly and you'll miss it.

It begins with a staircase carved out of the sandstone leading up and away from the road. Soon, you'll be walking along the side of the mountain and looking down into a thin crevice known as Pine Creek Canyon. At about halfway, you'll walk across a bridge that wraps around a corner and leads to an area of recessed rock wet with the moisture that caused it to erode and be filled with ferns growing out of the sandstone.

The East Rim Trail

After positioning a vehicle or making shuttle arrangements at the Weeping Rock parking lot, watch for the small "trailhead" sign along the Zion-Mt. Carmel Highway, immediately west of the east entrance booth.

This trail is said to be one of the most scenic in all of Zion National Park and is on many lists as one of the best hikes in Utah. This trek begins on the east side of the park and climbs over 1,400 feet to the rim. This hike begins with a backdoor view of Checkerboard Mesa as it skirts Clear Creek for a short time and steadily and gently climbs through a juniper and pine forest. On top of the mesa, scenery gets interesting as a spectacular view of Echo Canyon takes center stage.

Warning: These hikes are very popular and often overcrowded. If you are feeling up to some of the more difficult hikes, try some of these popular hikes.

Angels Landing via West Rim Trail

Possibly the most popular hike in Zion, Angels Landing takes around four hours to complete, covers just under 5 1/2 miles, and requires a permit to hike. As you work your way up the 1,488-foot change in elevation, you'll want to look out for long drop-offs. This hike is not for young children or people with a fear of heights. Be sure to enjoy, but be careful along the last section of the hike, which is a steep, narrow ridge to the summit. The hike starts at The Grotto.

The Narrows via Riverside Walk

A full-day hike at 8 hours, the Narrows can pose extra dangers depending on the weather. High water levels can prevent access to the Narrows, so be sure to check with the visitor center before beginning this 9 1/2-mile hike. You'll start this hike at Temple of Sinawava.

Kolob Arch via La Verkin Creek Trail

Getting to Kolob Arch via the La Verkin Creek Trail follows Timber and La Verkin

creeks and connects to the trail to Kolob Arch, one of the world's largest freestanding arches. A full-day hike, it will take around 8 hours to finish the 14-fourteen mile trip. This hike starts at Kolob Canyons Road.

If you are looking for something more moderate, try some of these mid-range hikes.

Kaventa Trail

This two-hour hike starts at the Grotto and goes for two miles. You'll gain 150 feet in elevation, and the trail does have long dropoffs. This unpaved climb connects the Grotto to the Emerald Pools trails.

Canyon Overlook Trail

Starting at Zion-Mt. Carmel Highway, this one-hour hike provides a 163-foot gain in elevation over the course of a mile. This rocky and uneven trail ends at a viewpoint for Pine Creek Canyon and lower Zion Canyon. While this trail is mostly fenced, there are long drop-offs.

Taylor Creek Trail

You'll begin this five-mile hike at Kolob Canvons Road. It should take around 4 hours to complete and provides a 450-foot gain in elevation. Larger groups may need to split up, as this hike limits 12 people to a group. It follows the Middle Fork of Taylor Creek past two homestead cabins to Double Arch Alcove.

Timber Creek Overlook Trail

A quick hike, the Timber Creek Overlook Trail covers just one mile and 100 feet in elevation gain. It can be done in about 30 minutes. The trail follows a ridge to a small peak with views of Timber Creek, Kolob Terrace, and Pine Valley Mountains.

Those looking for something less strenuous should check out these easy hikes.

Pa'rus Trail

Starting at the Zion Canyon Visitor Center, this two-hour hike covers 3 1/2 miles and rises 50 feet in elevation. A paved trail that follows the Virgin River from the South Campground to Canyon Junction, Pa'rus Trail is wheelchair accessible and is open to both bicycles and dogs.

Archeology Trail

Also starting at the Zion Canyon Visitor Center, this short half-hour hike covers just under half a mile and rises 80 feet in elevation, making it a short but steep trail. This trail offers trailside exhibits and views of several prehistoric buildings.

Grotto Trail

Starting at Zion Lodge or the Grotto, this trail connects the two locations and can be combined with the Middle Emerald Pools and Kayenta trails to create a 2 1/2-mile loop. The non-loop version should take about 30 minutes and rises 35 feet over one mile.

Riverside Walk

Starting at Temple of Sinawava, this 1 1/2-hour hike cover just over two miles and rises 57 feet in elevation. While it is wheelchair accessable, there are minor dropoffs. The trail, which is paved, offers trailside exhibits as it follows the Virgin Rivet along the bottom of a narrow canyon.







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Southern Utah State & National Parks

ANASAZI STATE PARK MUSEUM - This ancient Indian village in the heart of Utah's canyon country was one of the largest Anasazi communities west of the Colorado River. The site is believed to have been occupied from A.D. 1050 to 1200. The village remains largely unexcavated, but many artifacts have been uncovered and are on display in the newly remodeled museum. Anasazi State Park is in the picturesque town of Boulder on State Route 12. Group and individual picnic areas are available. There is no camping. (435) 335-7308.

BAKER - Baker Reservoir is a small lake on the Santa Clara River four miles north of Veyo on Utah State Route 18. It is a 63-acre lake with an average depth of about 20 feet. Many people come to the reservoir to camp at one of its 10 campsites and to fish. The reservoir is stocked with rainbow trout and contains brown trout, green sunfish, crayfish, redside shiner, and mountain sucker. It has picnic areas and vault toilets. There is a fee for visiting the reservoir and no boat ramp.

BRYCE CANYON - Bryce Canyon National Park is a scientist's laboratory and a child's playground. Because Bryce transcends 2,000 feet of elevation, the park exists in three distinct climatic zones: spruce/fir forest, ponderosa pine forest and pinion pine/juniper forest. This diversity of habitat provides for high biodiversity. Here at Bryce, you can enjoy over 100 species of birds, dozens of mammals, and more than a thousand plant species. (435) 834-5322.

CEDAR BREAKS - Sitting at over 10,000 feet and looking down into a half-mile deep geologic amphitheater. Come wander among timeless bristlecone pines, stand in lush meadows of wildflowers, ponder crystal-clear night skies and experience the richness of our subalpine forest. Just four miles off Utah Highway 148, you'll find the Cedar Breaks National Monument parking lot.



CORAL PINK SAND DUNES - At an elevation of 6,000 feet and 12 paved miles off U.S. Highway 89 near Kanab, this park provides a fantastic setting for camping, hiking, OHV riding or just playing in the sand. A 265-acre conservation area prohibits motorized vehicles in order to protect the Coral Pink beetle (found nowhere else in the world) and its habitat. The mule deer, jackrabbit, kit fox, coyote, and many small rodents also make the park their home. (435) 648-2800.

DEAD HORSE POINT - Dead Horse Point State Park is perhaps Utah's most spectacular state park. Dead Horse Point is a promontory of stone surrounded by steep cliffs near Moab. The overlook at Dead Horse Point is 6,000 feet above sea level. Two-thousand feet below, the Colorado River winds its way from the continental divide in Colorado to the Gulf of California, a distance of 1,400 miles. (435) 259-2614.

DINOSAUR TRACKS - The St. George Dinosaur Discovery Site at Johnson Farm is home to exceptionally well-preserved dinosaur tracks, some displaying skin impressions. These tracks, along with hundreds of fossil fish, plants, rare dinosaur remains, invertebrates' traces, and important sedimentary structures, show evidence that this site was produced along the western edge of a large, Early Jurassic (age between 195-198 million years ago) freshwater lake. (435) 574-3466.

ENTERPRISE - There are two reservoirs in the Bull Valley Mountains 10 miles southwest of the town of Enterprise. The main one is Upper Enterprise Reservoir, about 250 acres with an average depth of about 50 feet, while Lower Enterprise Reservoir is 79 acres. Many come to the reservoir to camp, fish hike, and boat. The Honeycomb Campground



is situated between both lakes and has 21 campsites and flush toilets. There is a boat ramp on Upper Enterprise Reservoir and several fishing areas around both reservoirs. Fishermen will find rainbow trout and smallmouth bass here. Fees are charged.

FOUR CORNERS - The Four Corners is the only place in the U.S. where four states come together at one place: Arizona, New Mexico, Utah and Colorado. Here, a person can put each of their hands and feet in four states at the same time. The unique landmark is on Navajo Nation land and is open for visits from the public. West of U.S. Highway 160, 40 miles southwest of Cortez, Colo. (928) 871-6436.

GRAND CANYON - A World Heritage Site encompassing 1,218,375 acres on the Colorado Plateau in northwestern Arizona. The land is semi-arid and consists of raised plateaus and structural basins typical of the southwestern United States. (928) 638-7888.

GRAND STAIRCASE-ESCALANTE NATIONAL MONUMENT - Nearly 1.9 million acres of America's public lands and located between Bryce Canyon and Glen Canyon Recreational Areas. From its namesake Grand Staircase of cliffs and terraces across the rugged Kaiparowits Plateau to the beauty of the Escalante River Canyons, the Monument's size, resources, and isolated location provide amazing opportunities.

GUNLOCK - In scenic red rock country, 15 miles northwest of St. George, lies the 240-acre Gunlock State Park and Reservoir where year-round boating, water sports, and quality fishing for bass and catfish attract visitors. Facilities include boat launching ramp and pit privies. (435) 628-2255.

LAKE MEAD - Lake Mead National Recreation Area offers a wealth of things to do and places to go year-round. Its huge lakes cater to boaters, swimmers, sunbathers and fishermen, while its desert rewards hikers, wildlife photographers, and roadside sightseers. It is also home to thousands of desert plants and animals adapted to survive in an extreme place where rain is scarce and temperatures soar. (702) 293-8990.

LAKE POWELL - In Glen Canyon National Recreation Area is one of the world's great places for houseboating! The 186-mile-long lake offers sandy beaches, cool blue water, and exceptional red-rock scenery. It is excellent for boating, skiing, kayaking, and fishing. Boat or hike to Rainbow Bridge, or explore any of its many canyons or sand dunes. (928) 608-6200.

PINE VALLEY - Pine Valley Reservoir is a beautiful place for fishermen to fish brook trout and rainbow trout. The reservoir is near the Pine Valley Recreation Complex, which has over 150 campsites with picnic and restroom facilities. This area is greener than most other parts of southwestern Utah with pine and pinion trees, and many come to enjoy camping and hiking. It is west of the town of Central. (435) 652-3100.


QUAIL LAKE - Quail Creek State Park provides excellent year-round camping, picnicking, boating, and trout and bass fishing in sunny southwest Utah. The park is three miles east of the Interstate 15 Hurricane exit on Utah State Route 9. Facilities include 23 campsites, modern restrooms, a fish cleaning station, and two covered group-use pavilions. (435) 879-2378.

SAND HOLLOW - Looking to fish? Swim? Ride your ATV in the sand? Do all that and more at Sand Hollow State Park, located between St. George and Hurricane. Bring your boat, a picnic, and some fishing gear for a fun day on the reservoir, or watch the kids swim while you relax on the beach. Load up your RV or tent and settle in for a nice campout, or ride your ATV in the dunes of Sand Mountain. (435) 680-0715.



SNOW CANYON - Named after early Utah leaders Lorenzo and Erastus Snow, Snow Canyon State Park begins just outside of Ivins and stretches northward. Spectacular scenery includes towering red and white sandstone cliffs, black lava formations, and even a waterfall that appears during heavy rain. Snow Canyon offers 16 miles of hiking trails, beautiful sand dunes, technical rock climbing sites, horseback riding, year-round camping, nature studies, and wildlife viewing. This park is a favorite for locals and visitors alike. (435) 628-2255.

ZION - With breathtaking views, numerous hiking attractions of all difficulty levels and some of the most spectacular scenery on earth, Zion National Park and its surrounding areas attract thousands of visitors every year. This natural wonder is not only a mecca of recreational activity, but Zion and nearby Springdale host numerous cultural activities, as well. There's something for everyone in Zion - whether you're looking for a challenging hike or a fun excursion for the family. (435) 772-3256.








