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ART DEFINED BY DIVERSITY: ESCALANTE CANYONS ART FESTIVAL TURNS 21

Escalante, UT

Escalante Canyons Art Festival (ECAF) will celebrate its 21st year in the breathtaking red rock scenery of Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument from September 19 to 28, 2025. What began as a grassroots effort to bring artists into the wild beauty of southern Utah has grown into a multifaceted, ten-day event that blends art, music, natural history, and community.

This year's lineup is as diverse as the landscape itself, offering opportunities for every kind of creative. Visual art takes center stage, with demonstrations and classes across a wide range of styles. Attendees can learn the fine lines of woodcut printmaking, explore simplified watercolor plein air, practice painting shapes and shadows in the shifting sun, or dive into on-site oil painting sessions. Other workshops include composing a Southwestern landscape and creating nature-inspired abstracts—each offering practical instruction while surrounded by some of the most dramatic terrain in the West.

The festival also celebrates artistic achievement through its competitions. Winners will take home a share of \$10,000 in awards across six categories: plein air, studio work, junior, miniature, abstract, and nocturne. These juried events showcase not only the technical skill but also the wide perspectives artists bring to interpreting the Escalante landscape.

ECAF is not limited to visual artists. Writers will find inspiration through workshops on storytelling in the desert setting, designed to encourage creative reflection tied directly to place. Naturalist sessions add another dimension, with participants guided in identifying clouds, medicinal plants, bats, and conifers through discussions led by professional herbalists and rangers. Each day also features excursions into the vast public lands of the monument, where artists, writers, and visitors alike can



learn and create on-site.

This year's featured local artists, Dwight and Jalene Vance, will present their extensive collection of award-winning wood carvings. Their works range from detailed Santas and whimsical characters to fish, spoons, and natural scenes, each piece carved with precision and care. Textile art also has a strong presence, with both heritage and modern quilts on display.

Performance art adds another vibrant layer. Musicians will share an eclectic mix, spanning jazz, folk, rock, bluegrass, and Norwegian instrumental melodies, offering audiences a constantly shifting soundtrack throughout the festival. In addition, four painters will demonstrate different plein air methods while tackling the same landscape: a watercolorist, a pastelist, an oil painter using a brush, and an oil painter using a palette knife. These side-by-side sessions highlight the diversity of approach that defines plein air art and remind audiences how one view can inspire entirely different artistic interpretations.

ECAF is a participatory festival at heart. Whether you come as an artist ready to compete, a writer looking for inspiration, a naturalist eager to learn, a vendor hoping to share your work, or a visitor who simply wants to browse or buy, there is a place for you. The atmosphere is one of inclusion and encouragement, where both seasoned professionals and curious newcomers are welcomed into the creative community.

The spirit of diversity and variety defines not only the event but also the setting. Escalante's red rock canyons, expansive skies, and rugged beauty create a backdrop that naturally inspires creativity. In celebrating art in all its forms—visual, performance, literary, and natural history—the Escalante Canyons Art Festival remains one of Utah's most eclectic and uplifting cultural gatherings.

ART PROVIDES OPENS 'HERSTORY REFRAMED' CALL FOR ART 2026 EXHIBIT


St. George, UT

ART Provides has opened submissions for *Herstory Reframed*, a curated group exhibition that tells of her story through visual art. During ART Provides' interim as a mobile organization, the 2026 exhibit will be installed at a pop-up venue in Washington County. A location has been secured, venue details will be announced closer to the exhibition to prevent premature inquiries to the host site and to keep the focus on the work. Accepted artists will receive full venue information with their acceptance packet.

Herstory Reframed explores layered stories of women, welcoming direct or abstract interpretations. Themes may include

resilience and resistance, body, identity, and voice, ancestry, lineage, and care, feminine labor, leadership, and liberation, and memory, myth, and future making. Work that sparks dialogue, honors nuance, and offers a lens into personal or collective experience is encouraged.

All visual media are eligible, including painting, photography, sculpture, digital art, fiber, and mixed media. Artists may submit up to eight

available pieces for consideration, with final selections based on quality, relevance, and curatorial balance. Artwork must be original and for sale, a 40 percent commission applies. Submissions should include high-resolution JPG or PNG files labeled with the artist's name and artwork title, along with title, dimensions, medium, and a brief statement for each piece. Artists are responsible for delivery and return shipping, include a prepaid return label if needed.

The submission deadline is Monday, November 4, 2025, notifications will be sent Tuesday, November 18, 2025. The exhibition runs March 6 through April 18, 2026. The entry fee is \$30 per artist. To apply, complete the form, upload images and your inventory list, and pay the fee at artprovides.org/pages/call-to-artists-app. Questions may be directed to info@artprovides.org.

DIXIE DAYS RETURNS WITH A WEEK OF COMMUNITY CELEBRATION


September 15–21, 2025 — St. George, UT

Dixie Days returns September 15–21 for a week of events that celebrate heritage, creativity, and community spirit in St. George. From rodeo nights and parades to carnivals and concerts, the second annual celebration offers something for everyone.

"Dixie Days is more than an event. It's a celebration of who we are," said Mayor Michele Randall. "From the Dixie Roundup Rodeo and parade, to the carnival and drone show, to the festival and Dinner on Main, there's something for everyone to enjoy."

Weeklong Highlights

The festivities begin September 15 with an evening drone show above Red Hills Desert Garden, visible across downtown with the Dixie Sunbowl as a prime viewing area. On September 16, the Electric Theater hosts a free screening of *My Father's Highway*. Historic tours, known as Dixie Treks, will also be offered September 16–17,



guiding participants through sites like the Tabernacle attic, Pioneer Park, and Heritage Cove.

On September 17, Utah Tech University unveils its new Statue Garden at 9 AM, honoring five of America's greatest thinkers. That evening, the public is invited to explore the Human Performance Center from 6 to 9 PM.

Traditions and New Favorites

The Dixie Roundup Rodeo, now in its 91st year, takes place September 18–20 at the Dixie Sunbowl beginning at 7:30 PM nightly. Running alongside the rodeo, the Dixie Days Carnival brings rides, games, and food to Town Square September 18–21.

On September 18, Main Street transforms for Dinner on Main from 5 to 9 PM, offering a chef's table dining experience under the stars.

Saturday, September 20, starts with the Dixie Days Dash at 8 AM, followed by the Dixie Roundup Rodeo Parade at 9 AM along 100 South, finishing at the Sunbowl. Vernon Worthen Park then hosts the Dixie Days Festival from 9 AM to 2 PM, featuring artisan vendors, food trucks, fresh produce, live entertainment, a petting zoo, tractor rides, and family attractions.

Community Spirit

With its mix of tradition and new attractions, Dixie Days has quickly become one of the most anticipated celebrations in Southern Utah.

ORCHESTRA OF SOUTHERN UTAH LAUNCHES SEASON WITH "AMERICA'S PLAYLIST"



October 9, 2025 — Cedar City, UT

The Orchestra of Southern Utah (OSU) opens its 2025–2026 season October 9 at the Heritage Theater in Cedar City with *Stage Meets the Silver Screen*, a celebration of beloved movie and Broadway music. Under the direction of Music Director and Conductor Carylee Zwang, the season presents a wide variety of American music as part of the national America250 commemoration.

Season Highlights

The opening night program features hits from *Mary Poppins Suite*, *West Side Story Dances*, *Phantom of the Opera*, and "If I Were a Rich Man" from *Fiddler on the Roof*, performed alongside local vocalists.

On October 11 at 2 PM, the popular **Children's Jubilee** brings art, science, and music together in a family-friendly concert. Activities begin at noon, admission is "pay as you can," and donations of food benefit SUU's Hope Pantry.

On November 20, OSU presents its third **Rock Gold** concert with favorites by the Beach Boys, Madonna, and Aerosmith. Auditions for additional repertoire, including music by Adele and Shania Twain, are ongoing.

Handel's Messiah returns December 14–15, marking the 85th Cedar City performance of this holiday tradition. A commu-

nity choir will join the orchestra, with solo auditions set for September 25.

The February 19 concert opens with the **Star-Spangled Banner**, followed by Copland's *Rodeo Suite*, Gershwin's *Rhapsody in Blue* featuring pianist Christian Bohnstengel, and Americana favorites like *Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy*, *The Entertainer*, and *Blue Tango*.

On April 9, OSU presents the **Hal Campbell Young Composers Concert**, showcasing winning works by emerging composers alongside Barber's *Adagio for Strings* and Bernstein's *Overture to Candide*.

A Season of Collaboration

Throughout the season, OSU will collaborate with Cedar Valley Community Theater, Canyon View High School, and other community groups. "We are pleased to combine with several community groups this season in honor of America250," said Zwang. "Please join us as we bring amazing music and entertainment to the stage."

The festival also welcomes an impressive roster of horror industry pros, including Alec Gillis, founder of Studio Gillis and creature effects legend (*Aliens*, *Predator*, *Tremors*); Joseph and Vanessa Winter, creators of Shudder's cult hit *Deadstream*; Frank Dietz, veteran screenwriter (*Creepshow TV*), actor (*Black Roses*), and Disney animator (*Hercules*); and James and Chelsea of *Dead Meat*, best known for *The Kill Count*.

Tucked right off I-15, The Creamery isn't just a cheese shop—it's a road trip oasis serving up crave-worthy comfort food, small-batch ice cream, and a market full of Utah-made goods.

And of course, we didn't leave without sampling the ice cream. The Creamery's house-made flavors are rich, creamy, and the perfect end to a meal you didn't know you needed on I-15.

More than just a restaurant, The Creamery includes a charming store packed with local cheeses, jams, snacks, and gift-



On a recent drive home from a Stick Figure concert, we finally gave in to curiosity and pulled over. The Creamery had been catching our eye for ages—its bright blue silo and modern farmhouse vibe feel like a billboard come to life. And once inside, it fully delivers.



My guy and I each ordered a sandwich, then went halves so we could try both. The braised short rib was the standout—melty, slow-cooked beef paired with an au jus that was rich enough to drink. The avocado bacon ranch sandwich was no slouch either, layered with smoky bacon, crisp greens, and a creamy ranch with just the right tang. We rounded things out with a side of cheese curds—golden and perfectly squeaky—and a comforting cup of tomato soup.

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WELCOME TO UTAH WINE COUNTRY AT ZION VINEYARDS

September 2025 — Leeds, UT

Harvest season is underway at Zion Vineyards, where rows of grapes ripen under the Southern Utah sun. The vineyard began picking white varieties in mid-August and is now harvesting reds, with several more to come. Each grape variety ripens on its own schedule, meaning harvest is celebrated again and again throughout the season.



Be Part of the Harvest

Ripeness is measured with a refractometer, which shows the sugar concentration, or Brix level, of the grapes. Once the winemaker determines they are ready, volunteers are invited to help pick. Those who sign up at the tasting room receive email notifications, with the first 12 RSVPs joining the team. Harvest mornings begin at 7 AM, with picking from 7:30 to 11:30, followed by lunch. Volunteers also get to watch the grapes being crushed before heading home with a gift.

Wines of Distinction

Zion Vineyards offers a growing selection of wines that highlight the unique flavors of Utah's terroir.

- **Cabernet Sauvignon:** Bold with dark fruit flavors of currants and cherry, balanced with tobacco, smoke, vanilla, and clove.
- **Miscela Rossa:** A Bordeaux-style blend of Cabernet Sauvignon,



Zinfandel, and Tempranillo. Fruit-forward with earth and smoke notes, plum, blueberry, and a chocolatey finish.

- **Tempranillo Reserve:** A Spanish varietal aged in new French oak. Dry, full-bodied, with notes of red cherry, dried fig, and spice.

Owner and vintner Michael Jackson considers the vineyard his legacy.

Winemaker Robert Cec, a self-taught craftsman, has already earned acclaim for producing wines with both depth and balance—reds that are bold and expressive, and whites with crisp citrus and fruit notes.

Visit the Tasting Room

The tasting room at Zion Vineyards is open daily from noon to 6 PM. Guests are invited to enjoy flights of handcrafted wines, learn about the winemaking process, and experience Utah's growing wine country firsthand.

The Southern Utah Museum of Art (SUMA) at Southern Utah University has appointed Dr. Rebecca “Becky” Bloom as Interim Director following the departure of Executive Director Jessica Kinsey, who accepted a faculty position at the University of Oklahoma. Bloom begins her new role August 1, 2025.

Bloom has been SUMA’s Diane P. Stewart Director of Curatorial Affairs since 2022, bringing expertise in Tibetan Buddhism, Buddhist material culture, and the role of religion in museums. At SUMA, she has curated exhibitions that connect local and global perspectives, including *The Space Between: Visions of the Southwest*, *Harry Bertoia: Master Modernist*, *Salt Lines: Exploring Climate, Environment, and the Saline Influx*, and *A Dream Deferred*.



“Becky brings a depth of knowledge, curiosity, and heart to everything she touches,” said Michael T. Schmidt, Dean of SUU’s College of Performing & Visual Arts. “Her leadership will ensure continuity and innovation during this transitional period.”

In addition to her curatorial work, Bloom has taught History of Non-Western Art at SUU since 2023. Safety Tips For Zion

Emergencies

For 24-hour emergency response, call 911 or (435) 772-3322. The Zion Canyon Medical Clinic is located in Springdale near the south entrance to the park. For hours, please call (435) 772-3226. Other medical clinics are located in Hurricane. The nearest hospitals are in St. George, Cedar City, and Kanab.

Hydrate and use refillable water bottles

It is easy to get dehydrated while hiking and walking in the desert, so pack along extra water, and be sure to take rest and water breaks on long hikes. There are a number of places to refill your water bottles in Zion National Park including the visitors' center and Zion Lodge as well as a new hydration station at the Springdale bus stop in front of The Bumbleberry Inn and Zion Canyon Brew Pub.

Be cautious near steep cliffs

Falls from cliffs on trails can result in death. Loose sand or pebbles on stone are very slippery. Be careful of edges when using cameras or binoculars. Never throw or roll rocks because there may be hikers below you. Stay on the trail. Stay back from cliff edges. Observe posted warnings. Please watch children.

Watch for flash floods

All narrow canyons are potentially hazardous. Flash floods, often caused by storms miles away, are a real danger and can be life threatening. You are assuming a risk when entering a narrow canyon. Your safety is your responsibility.



Tips To Minimize Your Impact

Pack it in, pack it out & use recycling bins

Each month, Zion National Park pays many thousands of dollars to haul away waste collected from garbage cans and recycling bins. Your experience and that of everyone who visits Zion Canyon can be improved by never littering and making sure you pick up any trash you see along the way. Recycling bins are placed strategically throughout Zion Park, and it is highly encouraged for everyone to use them.



Please stay on the marked trails

Hiking off trails can lead to loss of vegetation, soil compaction, erosion, and unsightly scars on the landscape. Remember, if you bring it in, please pack it out.

Go before you go

It is always a good idea to use the restroom before you begin a hike since facilities are limited to select locations. If you do need to take care of your business, please pack it back out.

Be respectful to the wildlife

Feeding, harming, or capturing wild animals is illegal and can cause injury or death to the animal. Animals can become aggressive beggars when fed.

Please leave it how you found it

It is illegal to remove anything from Zion National Park, including flowers, rocks, or anything else that you might find. Do not write or carve on natural surfaces.



Top Things To Do In Zion

Get some great hiking in

Zion National Park is known for its scenic landscape and unrivaled hikes. No matter your fitness level, there are hikes here for you. Please go to ZionGuide.com to see the details on many area hikes.

Spend a day in Springdale

Springdale is unique to our national park system in that it is almost completely surrounded by Zion National Park. So when you're in Springdale, you're right in the middle of Zion Canyon.

Catch an event

Not only does Zion Brew Pub have live music every Saturday, the property also hosts a handful of events throughout the year, as do the Bit and Spur restaurant, Tanner Amphitheater, Bumbleberry Inn, Wildcat Willies, and several other locations.

Try a guided tour

Jeep, helicopter, ATV, canyoneering, horseback riding, or mountain biking, guided tours are all available. Many of these tours take you outside Zion National Park boundaries and give you a unique perspective on Zion's canyons and plateaus from surrounding areas of southern Utah. Visit the east side of Zion and spend a day in Kanab

The east side of Zion is generally less crowded, making hikes more accessible and private. These are some of the most enjoyable hikes in the canyon. Tips To Maximize Enjoyment

Go on a less crowded hike

The most visited Zion hikes have a lot of competition. If you'd rather not feel like you're in the line at a theme park, consider seeking out a less traveled path. Check out our feature, Less-Traveled Zion Hikes, in this issue.

To avoid the crowds, go early or late in the day

Consider getting up extra early or trekking out midday after the initial rush has flooded in. Especially during the Summer months, it's highly recommended to go early!

Consider coming back again in the low season

Starting in the late fall, the number of visitors to Zion Canyon starts to dwindle, and by December it's significantly less than in the heat of the summer. It is simply a different experience to see Zion in the winter with the snow-capped monoliths. Most hikes are still accessible and are less crowded. You can also drive to the Temple of Sinawava parking lot. The shuttles stop running from November until March.

Check out Kolob Canyons & Kolob Terrace Road

With gorgeous open spaces and plenty of dirt roads to explore, Kolob Terrace Road is one of Zion's best kept secrets. You'll notice the air getting cooler as you gain elevation, and you'll find plenty of beautiful views worth stopping at for a quick photo op. The Kolob Terrace Road turnoff is in Virgin, so watch for signs. Portions of the Kolob Canyon District of Zion National Park are reached via Exit 40 on Interstate 15.

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

THE LOCALS' GUIDE TO HIKING PREPAREDNESS

National parks are seeing an uptick in helicopters carrying unfortunate hikers out of precarious situations.

In 2024, the National Park Service reported over 200 search-and-rescue operations, which means over 200 extremely unpleasant vacation experiences. Many more than just a decade ago. The majority of those rescues occurred in Zion and Bryce Canyon National Parks, and most hikers who end up getting into trouble are either in their 20s or are older than 60.

Despite our highly skilled and dedicated rescue teams' valiant efforts, not everyone made it out of their predicaments safely. An average of four people per year lose their lives in Zion and Bryce Canyon National Parks.

It's hard to imagine one wanting a vacation amid the splendor of our national parks to involve search and rescue teams or a close encounter with death.

Zion National Park is often referred to as an outdoor Disneyland. But this is the wilderness, and it's far less forgiving than any theme park. Here are some tips for how to safely enjoy your time in Zion Canyon.

Bring Water

You lose more water through perspiration than you realize, and if you are used to a moister climate — and nearly any climate is less arid than southern Utah — you can become dehydrated quickly without realizing it.

The National Park Service recommends that hikers bring a minimum of one gallon of water per hiker per day. There are fill stations throughout Springdale and the park that provided filtered water at no charge.

Natural water sources in the park such as creeks and streams are NOT reliable sources of clean drinking water. If you find yourself in a situation wherein you need

water but have none, it is strongly advised that any locally-sourced water intended for consumption first be filtered, boiled for at least 10 minutes, or treated with iodine before consuming.

Wear Appropriate Clothing

While most paths and trails are well maintained, this is the great outdoors, and a little loose gravel or slickrock can lead to injury — or worse. Think of appropriate footwear as an insurance policy — and if you are a little nervous, a hiking stick never hurts. Also, dress lightly if it's going to be hot, but be sure to use appropriate sun protection like sunscreen and large-

brimmed hats and UV protective clothing, because suffering from sunstroke or severe sunburn during an already taxing hike can be brutal.

Leave Wildlife Alone

Animals instinctively avoid humans, but the area is home to everything from poisonous snakes to mountain lions. Never approach local wildlife — and never try to feed them. This can result in injury to visitors, and numerous visitors have required stitches after attempting to hand-feed animals. But when humans feed wildlife, it's also not good for the animals, who are already best suited to feed themselves.

Leave No Trace

Zion's beauty is matched by its fragility. The red rock landscapes and delicate desert ecosystems are easily damaged, often taking years or decades to recover. That's why it's so important to leave no trace. Stay on designated trails to protect sensitive plant life, especially the black, crusty-looking soil known as biological soil crust — a vital part of the desert ecosystem. Pack out all trash, including food scraps, tissues, and biodegradable items. Use established restrooms when available, and if not, follow park guidelines for disposing of waste properly. Avoid carving into rocks or trees, and keep noise levels down so everyone can enjoy the peace of the canyon. When we leave no trace, we help ensure Zion remains as breathtaking for the next hiker as it was for us.

Hike Sober

Sometimes relatively stationary outdoor activities like boating or camping involve enjoying an alcoholic drink or two. But when you're hiking the varied terrain of our national parks, you don't want your coordination, balance, or judgment to be impaired to any extent. Zion Canyon, Springdale, and Kanab are home to several fine restaurants and bars — but visit them for a cocktail after your hike, not before.

Hike at Your Skill Level, and Don't Take Risks

Trails in Zion range from short and easy to long and challenging. Don't overestimate your ability and endurance level. And don't engage in horseplay or other activity that might endanger yourself or others. Some of Zion's hikes are steep, and you wouldn't be the first person to tumble down a hill — or worse, fall off a cliff. Zion is beautiful, but it's also dangerous, so respect yourself and others by respecting the terrain.

Popular Zion Hikes

Current Trail Closures & Popular Trail Considerations:

Hidden Canyon and Observation Point remain closed due to long-term rockfalls; Angels Landing requires a year-round lottery permit (apply via Recreation.gov); The Narrows closes when Virgin River flows exceed 150 cfs—always check current conditions; Zion Canyon Scenic Drive is shuttle-only March–November (including September); park entry requires the standard entrance fee but no reservation for shuttle or canyon access; September highs regularly exceed 100 °F—carry 3–4 L of water per person and hike early or late to avoid peak heat; Weeping Rock shuttle stop and trail remain closed; most other side trails remain open—watch for debris after storms; any overnight backpacking or top-down Narrows trip requires a wilderness permit; and beginning in June 2026, oversized vehicles will be rerouted off the Zion–Mount Carmel Highway and tunnel under new restrictions.

Angels Landing via West Rim Trail

Possibly the most popular hike in Zion, Angels Landing takes around four hours to complete, covers just under 5 1/2 miles, and requires a permit to hike. As you work your way up the 1,488-foot change in elevation, you'll want to look out for long drop-offs. This hike is not for young children or people with a fear of heights. Be sure to enjoy, but be careful along the last section of the hike, which is a steep, narrow ridge to the summit. The hike starts at The Grotto.

The Narrows via Riverside Walk

A full-day hike at 8 hours, the Narrows can pose extra dangers depending on the weather. High water levels can prevent access to the Narrows, so be sure to check with the visitor center before beginning this 9 1/2-mile hike. You'll start this hike at Temple of Sinawava.

Kolob Arch via La Verkin Creek Trail

Getting to Kolob Arch via the La Verkin Creek Trail follows Timber and La Verkin creeks and connects to the trail to Kolob Arch, one of the world's largest freestanding arches. A full-day hike, it will take around 8 hours to finish the 14-fourteen mile trip. This hike starts at Kolob Canyons Road.

If you are looking for something more moderate, try some of these mid-range hikes.

Kayenta Trail

This two-hour hike starts at the Grotto and goes for two miles. You'll gain 150 feet in elevation, and the trail does have long drop-

offs. This unpaved climb connects the Grotto to the Emerald Pools trails.

Canyon Overlook Trail

Starting at Zion-Mt. Carmel Highway, this one-hour hike provides a 163-foot gain in elevation over the course of a mile. This rocky and uneven trail ends at a viewpoint for Pine Creek Canyon and lower Zion Canyon. While this trail is mostly fenced, there are long drop-offs.

Taylor Creek Trail

You'll begin this five-mile hike at Kolob Canyons Road. It should take around 4 hours to complete and provides a 450-foot gain in

elevation. Larger groups may need to split up, as this hike limits 12 people to a group. It follows the Middle Fork of Taylor Creek past two homestead cabins to Double Arch Alcove.

Timber Creek Overlook Trail

A quick hike, the Timber Creek Overlook Trail covers just one mile and 100 feet in elevation gain. It can be done in about 30 minutes. The trail follows a ridge to a small peak with views of Timber Creek, Kolob Terrace, and Pine Valley Mountains.

Those looking for something less strenuous should check out these easy hikes.

Pa'rus Trail

Starting at the Zion Canyon Visitor Center, this two-hour hike covers 3 1/2 miles and rises 50 feet in elevation. A paved trail that follows the Virgin River from the South Campground to Canyon Junction, Pa'rus Trail is wheelchair accessible and is open to both bicycles and dogs.

Archeology Trail

Also starting at the Zion Canyon Visitor Center, this short half-hour hike covers just under half a mile and rises 80 feet in elevation, making it a short but steep trail. This trail offers trailside exhibits and views of several prehistoric buildings.


Grotto Trail

Starting at Zion Lodge or the Grotto, this trail connects the two locations and can be combined with the Middle Emerald Pools and Kayenta trails to create a 2 1/2-mile loop. The non-loop version should take about 30 minutes and rises 35 feet over one mile.

Riverside Walk

Starting at Temple of Sinawava, this 1 1/2-hour hike cover just over two miles and rises 57 feet in elevation. While it is wheelchair accessible, there are minor drop-offs. The trail, which is paved, offers trailside exhibits as it follows the Virgin Rivet along the bottom of a narrow canyon.

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Less-Traveled Zion Hikes

Current Trail Closures & Popular Trail Considerations:

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Northgate Peaks

The Northgate Peaks trail in the Kolob Terrace section of Zion National Park is an amazing trail with spectacular views. The trail itself is nearly flat, making it a perfect hike for families.

To reach the Northgate Peaks trailhead, take State Route 9 to the town of Virgin. Turn left onto Kolob Terrace Road. Drive for 15.7 miles through increasingly spectacular country until the short spur road (on the right) for the Wildcat Trailhead is reached. Drive a few hundred feet to the large parking area.

The trail heads east across grassy plains and stands of Ponderosa Pine with dynamite views of the towering Pine Valley Peak to the west. Soon the trail will be fully in the forest with limited views. After 0.9 miles, the junction with the Hop Valley trail is reached. Continue east, and 0.1 miles further, the junction with the Northgate Peaks Trail is reached. Head south on this trail for another 1.1 miles until the end of the official trail is reached at a rocky basalt bluff with epic views of the Northgate Peaks to the east and west and of North Guardian Angel to the south.

For families with young children, this makes an excellent turnaround spot.

Gifford Canyon

Gifford Canyon offers a nice stroll through a sandy wash and is very charming when water is running. This hike is nearly 3 miles long and will take about 2 hours to finish.

To start this hike, park in the lot located immediately east of the Zion/Mt. Carmel Tunnel. The trail begins at the backside of the restrooms at the back of the parking lot. There will be a steep, sandy



path to climb down before you enter Pine Creek slot. Follow the path upstream for almost 75 feet, and look for a 15-foot wall of slickrock. You can scramble up the rock or look for the beaten path on the backside of the rock.

On top of this wall is a narrow dirt path that is crowded by rock and vegetation. It winds around the mountain to a dead end with a beautiful view of the mountain where the Canyon Overlook Trail is located, opposite is Gifford Canyon.

The path will lead past stone bridge and to another minor slickrock climb. At the end of the canyon, there is a circle of cliffs preventing further exploration without climbing up the sandstone.

Chinle Trail

Chinle Trail is an off-the-beaten-path trail located in the lower elevation west desert wilderness area, offering wide vistas, desert landscapes, and a reprieve from the more touristy trails in the park. Though it's a long trail, it's a mellow hike that can be cut off whenever you feel like turning around. It's a great hike with kids because it's not treacherous, slippery, or steep. Avoid it after snow or rain as it will be muddy.

The Chinle Trailhead starts outside of Zion, south of Springdale. If you are coming from St. George, the turn is about a block before you hit the apple orchard and stand as you leave Rockville off of State Route 9. There is a parking area off the right of Anasazi Way near the Anasazi Plateau housing development. If you hit houses, you missed it. And yes, the trail starts below the housing development and takes you right through it. Don't worry though, it doesn't last long.

Shortly after you get through the housing development, you will hit a sign letting you know you are entering the Zion Wilderness. At this point, you can breathe a sigh of relief, because you have gotten

away from civilization to enjoy nature, and chances are that you won't see another soul until you return to your car.

Many Pools

The route is moderate with a gentle uphill climb to an alcove, but plan for a strenuous hike if you continue to the East Rim.

The route begins right off the highway. Drive to the pullout near the second drainage on the north side of the State Route 9, about 0.8 miles after the smaller tunnel. Walk carefully along the road about 150 yards and drop down into a sandy bowl on the north side of SR-9. There is a trail for a short distance, and then the sand turns into large flat stones that you can pick and choose to walk on, depending on your sense of balance. A short distance off the road, filled pools carved into the rocks appear. Ponderosa Pines and Juniper trees twisted by the wind are a good backdrop to the reds and whites ribboned through the rocks.

Overlook Trail

The Overlook Trail is a short, beautiful hike located on the east side of Zion National Park, just outside the Mt. Carmel tunnel. The hike is about one mile roundtrip, and it usually takes people about an hour. It is definitely one of the easier hikes in Zion, but it's still considered a moderate-level hike due to a few exposed areas and sandstone pathways, which can be slippery.

The Overlook trailhead lies right outside of the Mt. Carmel tunnel by the ranger booth. Exit the tunnel too quickly and you'll miss it.

It begins with a staircase carved out of the sandstone leading up and away from the road. Soon, you'll be walking along the side of the mountain and looking down into a thin crevice known as Pine Creek Canyon. At about halfway, you'll walk across a bridge that wraps around a corner and leads to an area of recessed rock wet with the moisture that caused it to erode and be filled with ferns growing out of the sandstone.

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Featured Hike

A CLASSIC ZION HIKE REVISITED: EMERALD POOLS

Location: Zion National Park
Difficulty: Easy to the Lower Pool, moderate to the Middle Pool, more strenuous to the Upper Pool
Distance: 1.2 miles to Lower, 2 miles to Middle, 2.5 miles to Upper (round trip)
Total elevation gain: 70 feet to Lower, 150 feet to Middle, 350 feet to Upper
Average time: 1–3 hours, depending on how far you go
Family-friendly: Lower Pool is great for nearly all ages; Middle and Upper are best for older kids and adults
Dog-friendly: No dogs are allowed on this trail
Access: Take the park shuttle to Zion Lodge (Stop #5). The Emerald Pools Bridge reopened in June 2025, restoring direct access across the Virgin River. Outside shuttle season, limited parking is available at the Lodge.

The Trail
 Emerald Pools was my very first hike in Zion National Park more than 14 years ago. For many visitors, it's the gateway hike — approachable yet rewarding, offering a taste of waterfalls, lush canyon vegetation, and towering cliffs without requiring a backcountry trek. I still remember stepping onto the trail for the first time and being surprised at how suddenly the desert gave way to something so green and alive.
 In Zion, waterfalls are more than just scenic — they're magical. They appear unexpectedly in a land of sun and stone, shimmering like silver veils and cooling the air around them. They feed hanging gardens that cling to sandstone walls and create small, fragile ecosystems. Whether a steady trickle or a roaring torrent after a storm, they transform the canyon into something almost enchanted.



The Lower Pool is the easiest to reach, just over half a mile from the trailhead on a mostly paved path shaded by cottonwoods and box elders. Here, waterfalls spill over the cliffs above, sometimes misting the trail as you pass behind them — a refreshing gift on hot summer afternoons. This is the spot where many families turn back, and it's perfect for first-time hikers or those with young children.

Continue on to the Middle Pools and the trail becomes steeper, switching back across sandstone steps. At two miles round trip, the effort is rewarded with views of Red Arch Mountain and two beautiful pools fed by canyons above. Water from Behunin Canyon feeds one, while Heaps Canyon drains into another before cascading over the edge toward the Lower Pool. The slickrock edges demand caution, but the views are breathtaking.

For those who keep climbing, the Upper Pool is the crown jewel. Enclosed by sheer sandstone walls, the amphitheater-like setting feels secluded and serene.

The pool itself is broad and shaded, often reflecting the cliffs above. Look closely and you may spot canyoneers descending from Heaps Canyon far above. It's the perfect place to pause, snack, and simply listen to the sound of water.

A Haven for Artists

Emerald Pools is more than just a family-friendly hike — it's also one of the easiest places in Zion for artists to set up for the day. Shaded alcoves and gentle overlooks make it an inviting plein air studio, with waterfalls, hanging gardens, and the ever-changing interplay of light and stone as subjects. For a painter, few places in the park are as welcoming or inspiring.

Tips

Family-friendly: Lower Pools is accessible for most ages; Middle and Upper are best for those steady on their feet.

Not dog-friendly: Pets are not permitted.


Access: Shuttle to Zion Lodge (Stop #5) and cross the newly rebuilt bridge to the trailhead.

Bring: Plenty of water, snacks, sunscreen, and a camera. Summer hikes are best started early in the morning.

With its bridge reopened and easy access restored, Emerald Pools continues to be one of Zion's most beloved trails. Whether it's your very first hike in the park or one you return to again and again, the pools remind us that even in the desert, water creates wonder.



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
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Zion Wilderness Map



NO CAMPFIRES

Campfires are prohibited in the Zion Wilderness. Fuel stoves and lanterns may be used for camping purposes, but should only be lit on bare ground away from all vegetation. In the interest of protection of environmental and scenic values, protection of natural resources, and public safety, these restrictions on fires are necessary. Please do all you can to protect the park from human caused wildfires.



FOOD STORAGE

All food and trash must be stored inside a secure hard sided container or interlocking wire mesh bag. For the welfare of park wildlife, your safety, and the safekeeping of your equipment, you should make your food items as unobtainable as possible. Your actions can put other people at risk of food pilfering, since animals regularly revisit areas where they easily obtained food. At worst, your behavior may lead directly to the death of a wild animal. These guidelines are meant to protect park wildlife, people, and equipment.



LEAVE NO TRACE

Protect the park from all graffiti and vandalism. All graffiti, including words, drawings, and arrows, no matter how small or superficially drawn, carved, scratched, or painted, is vandalism. Do not build rock cairns. If placed incorrectly, they can mislead visitors, cause unnecessary damage, and lead to potential injuries. Help protect Zion by not leaving your mark. Make memories, take photos, and leave no trace.




HUMAN WASTE

Pack out all solid human waste, toilet paper, diapers, and personal hygiene products. An environmentally friendly human waste disposal bag, complete with use and disposal instructions, is available for sale in the Zion Forever Park Store and at local outfitters. The contents of the disposal bag may then be deposited in the trash. Use of this waste disposal system is required for all Wilderness permit holders.



GROUP SIZE

Wilderness trails have a group size limit of 12. These limits apply to all trips into the park's wilderness, including trips that do not require a permit. Group size limits are strictly enforced. Groups that exceed these limits may not split up and visit the same route, or wilderness trail on the same day, but may split up and visit different areas.



Wildcat Canyon

At-large camping is limited to 20 people per night. 12 reservations are available online. The maximum group size is 12.

At-large camping is limited to 40 people per night. 20 reservations are available online. The maximum group size is 12.

Water Sources

The desert can be an extreme and unforgiving environment. Carry enough water, one gallon per person per day, and drink it. Never drink untreated water. Contact the Wilderness Staff at: zion_park_information@nps.gov, for current spring flow information. Plan ahead and prepare, your safety is your responsibility.

SPRINGS AND SEEPS
A spring is a place where water naturally flows out of the ground. Water flow magnitude at natural springs can vary throughout the park and may not always be reliable. Springs should usually be used as an emergency source for water, not as a primary source. Overnight camping is not permitted within a 1/4 mile of any spring.

CYANOBACTERIA
In remote Wilderness areas, current cyanotoxin conditions may be unknown. Cyanotoxins may cause illness and/or death if ingested or absorbed through an opening in the skin. The risk of exposure increases during and immediately after any precipitation events. Do not drink from instream water; no known filtration methods are effective at reducing toxin levels safe for drinking.

ZION CANYON SHUTTLE
The Zion Canyon Scenic Drive is closed to private vehicles during most of the year. The Zion Canyon shuttle provides access to the trailheads for the Emerald Pools, the West Rim, and the Narrows.

PRIVATE VEHICLES
The Zion-Mount Carmel Highway, Kolob Terrace Road, and Kolob Canyons Scenic Drive are open to private vehicles. Park roads are used by vehicles, bicycles, and wildlife. Obey posted speed limits. Park only in designated spaces to protect fragile vegetation.

BICYCLES
Bicycles are not permitted in the Zion Wilderness. Bicycling is permitted on all park roadways and on the Pa'rus Trail. Bicyclists must ride single file and stop to let shuttle buses pass.

HIKER SHUTTLE SERVICES
Commercial shuttle services can be hired to provide point-to-point pick-up and drop-off at designated parking areas within the park. All services must have a current Commercial Use Authorization (CUA) with Zion National Park. Search online for current authorized services.

OTHER VEHICLES
Any use of any off-highway vehicle (OHV), all-terrain vehicle (ATV), utility vehicles (UTV) or other motorized conveyance manufactured for recreational non-highway, off-road, or all-terrain travel is prohibited within Zion National Park.

Jeep Tours & Scenic Off-Road Drives

Let someone else do the driving while you soak in the views. Jeep tours offer access to some of the most jaw-dropping scenery in Southern Utah—without the need to hike for miles. Zion Jeep Tours based in Springdale offers half- and full-day trips to Zion's lesser-known gems, from mesa-top panoramas to desert slot canyons. Adventure Tours of Kanab specializes in scenic backroad excursions and guided hikes to amazing local sites like Peek-A-Boo Slot Canyon and White Pocket. Jeep and 4x4 tours are also available in the Coral Pink Sand Dunes area and around East Zion, with seasonal options from spring through late fall depending on weather and trail conditions.

Mountain Biking & eBiking

From Hurricane's world-famous singletrack to scenic bike routes through Zion Canyon, the area is a top-tier destination for cyclists. Over the Edge Cycles in Hurricane is a rider-favorite bike shop offering top-notch rentals, gear, and trail beta. Greater Zion eBikes in Springdale lets you cruise Zion Canyon by electric bike—ideal for riders of all skill levels. You'll also find bike shops and limited rentals in St. George, Springdale, and Cedar City, where local pros can help you pick trails or handle repairs. Best riding seasons are spring and fall, though e-bike routes are popular year-round.



River Rafting Adventures

Water might seem rare in the desert, but rafting is one of the most breathtaking ways to experience the region. Grand Canyon Expeditions (GCEX) offers multi-day rafting trips through stunning Grand Canyon scenery. Kayak the Colorado leads half- and full-day trips on calmer stretches near Glen Canyon and Lake Powell. Spring to early fall is prime river season, with outfitters based in Kanab, Page, and Big Water—just a short drive from Zion.

Horseback Riding

There's no better way to channel your inner pioneer than a trail ride on horseback. Ranches and outfitters around Zion, Bryce Canyon, and Grand Staircase-Escalante offer guided rides ranging from peaceful one-hour strolls to full-day backcountry adventures. Most operate from March through October.

Wine Tours, Breweries & Distilleries

Yes, Utah has wine—and it's worth exploring. Water Canyon Winery offers tasting rooms in both Hildale and Springdale, pairing red rock views with their handcrafted reds and whites. Zion Winery, located in Leeds, is a must-stop for visitors heading north. You'll also find Iron Gate Winery in Cedar City and Bold and Delaney in Dammeron Valley. Adding to the region's growing craft culture, several local breweries and distilleries have begun offering tours and tastings of their artisanal brews and spirits. Whether you're in the mood for a rich, locally brewed ale or a smooth, small-batch whiskey, you can often combine winery visits with stops at these innovative local establishments. Spring through fall is ideal for sipping and sightseeing, with some guided tours pairing wine tastings, brewery stops, and gourmet food in a scenic setting.

Photography Tours

Golden light on sandstone cliffs. Starry skies over silent mesas. The Zion region is a dream for landscape and night photographers. Local photography guides know when and where to go for the best light and angles—often in places you won't find on Google. Milky Way tours are popular May through September, with fall color excursions in October, and Stargazing Zion offers unforgettable Dark Sky experiences year-round.

Best Friends Animal Sanctuary

Located just outside Kanab, Best Friends Animal Sanctuary is the nation's largest no-kill sanctuary for companion animals—and one of the region's most beloved attractions. Visitors can take free guided tours, volunteer with cats, dogs, horses, and even pigs, or hike the scenic canyon trails that wind through the 3,700-acre campus. Whether you're an animal lover, a family with kids, or just looking for a peaceful and meaningful stop, Best Friends is must-see. It's open year-round and pairs perfectly with a visit to Kanab's other natural attractions.

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Beyond Hiking

THE BEST DRIVES & DAY TRIPS AROUND ZION

We're glad you're here—and if you're reading this, chances are you came for the world-famous hikes, towering cliffs, and unforgettable canyons of Zion National Park. But maybe you've already hiked Angels Landing or tackled The Narrows. Or maybe you're looking for a different kind of adventure—something a little less strenuous, a little more scenic, or just a great way to spend a day in the car with some jaw-dropping views.

Well, you're in luck. Zion sits in the middle of a wonderland of scenic drives, hidden gems, and bucket-list day trips. So, whether you're taking it easy, chasing new sights, or looking for ways to escape the crowds, here are some top picks to round out your Southern Utah experience.

Scenic Drives and Viewpoints

Kolob Canyons (Zion National Park – Northwest Entrance)

If you love Zion but want something quieter, head to the Kolob Canyons section of the park. Located off I-15 near Cedar City, this five-mile scenic drive offers massive red rock cliffs, sweeping vistas, and several short hikes. It's a perfect add-on for road trippers and a beautiful detour on your way north.

Kolob Terrace Road

A local favorite, this backroad winds its way from the town of Virgin up into the cooler high country above Zion. Along the way, you'll pass lava fields, meadows, forested plateaus, and killer canyon views. There's even a reservoir near the top if you want to dip your toes.

Zion-Mount Carmel Tunnel

Even if you've already been through the tunnel, it's worth a second look. The

drive east from Springdale through Zion Canyon and out to the East Entrance is one of the most dramatic in the state. Stop at the many pullouts along the way to take in views of slickrock formations, bighorn sheep, and winding canyons.

Gooseberry Mesa

This spot is a mecca for mountain bikers, but the road out to Gooseberry is scenic. You'll need a high-clearance vehicle for the final stretch, but you'll be rewarded with stunning panoramic views over Zion and the Virgin River Valley.

Smithsonian Butte Backway

This off-the-beaten-path route connects Rockville to Apple Valley with unpaved road and unparalleled views. Think mesas, cliffs, and the perfect backdrop for golden hour photos. It's a local secret—and one of the best-kept ones at that.

Best Day Trips and Nearby Parks Bryce Canyon National Park

About 90 minutes from Zion, Bryce is known for its bizarre and beautiful hoodoos—towering spires of red and orange rock that glow at sunrise and sunset. You

can easily drive the scenic loop and stop at multiple viewpoints or stretch your legs with a short hike into the amphitheater.

Grand Canyon North Rim

Less visited than the South Rim, the North Rim normally offers a cooler, quieter experience. It lies roughly 2.5 hours from Zion but is closed for the 2025 season due to the Dragon Bravo wildfire.

Coral Pink Sand Dunes State Park

Located just outside Kanab, this state park features rolling hills of—you guessed it—deep coral-colored sand. Rent a sandboard, hop on an ATV, or just enjoy the surreal landscape.

Snow Canyon State Park

Tucked just north of St. George, this park is a mini-desert paradise filled with lava flows, red cliffs, and white sandstone. It's perfect for a short hike or scenic drive and less than an hour from Zion.

Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument

Vast, rugged, and full of secrets, Grand Staircase offers endless day trip options. Popular stops include the Toadstools, Willis Creek Slot Canyon, and Cottonwood Canyon Road. A high-clearance vehicle is recommended for some routes.

Whether you're a hiker, a cruiser, or just here for the views, Southern Utah has more to offer than one trip can hold. Flip the page for more top parks in the region—and happy exploring!



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


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Zion National Park Shuttle Info

The seasons are changing in Zion National Park! Every year, the National Park Service (NPS) adjusts shuttle schedules and campground availability throughout the year.

Here's What You Need To Know To Plan Your Visit

- You do not need a ticket or reservation to ride the park shuttle or enter the park.
- During the shuttle season, visitors cannot drive personal vehicles on Zion Canyon Scenic Drive.

• Shuttles arrive about every 15 minutes on the Springdale Line (outside the park) and about every 5-10 minutes on the Zion Canyon Line (inside the park).

• Shuttles will not run December 2-20. Shuttles take about 45 minutes to drive between the Zion Canyon Visitor Center and the Temple of Sinawava. This means a round trip takes about an hour and a half.

Be mindful of the time you board the shuttle back to the Zion Canyon Visitor Center at the end of the day. You should not wait for the last shuttle of the day. If the last shuttle is full, or if you miss the last shuttle, you may have to walk nine miles back to the Zion Canyon Visitor Center.

Zion Canyon Line

• First bus departs Zion Canyon Visitor Center to Temple of Sinawava at 7 AM through May 17th, then at 6 AM from May 18th to September 14th.

• Last bus departs Zion Canyon Visitor Center to Temple of Sinawava at 5 PM through May 17th, then at 7 PM from May 18th to September 14th.

• Last bus departs the Temple of Sinawava to Zion Canyon Visitor Center at 7:15 PM through May 17th, then at 8:15 PM from May 18th to September 14th.

• Last bus departs Zion Canyon Village (Stop #1) at 7 PM through May 17th, then at 8 PM from May 18th to September 14th.

Springdale Line

• First bus leaves the Hotel De Novo (Stop #9) at 8 AM through May 17th, then at 7 AM from May 18th to September 14th.

• Last bus leaves Zion Canyon Village (Stop #1) at 7 PM through May 17th, then at 8 PM from May 18th to September 14th.

Camping

Watchman Campground is open year-round, and you can make a reservation up to six months before your visit at www.recreation.gov or by calling 1-877-444-6777. Plan ahead and make arrangements for where you will stay before you get to the park.

South Campground is closed for a long-term rehabilitation project.

Lava Point Campground is a 1-hour drive from Zion Canyon. Reservation only.

Visitor Center and Wilderness Permit Desk Hours

Zion Canyon & Kolob Canyons Visitor Centers

• The Information Desk opens at 8 AM and closes at 5 PM every day.

Wilderness Permit Desks

• Zion Canyon Wilderness Desk: Open daily from 8 AM to 5 PM.

• Kolob Canyons Wilderness Desk: Closed until late 2024.

Attend a Zion Canyon Ranger-Led Patio Talk

Free ranger talks happen outside of the Zion Canyon Visitor Center every day at:

• 11 AM, 1:30 PM and 3 PM

No matter when you visit, be prepared for crowds and remember:

• Parking fills early year-round. You may have to wait to enter Zion Canyon Scenic Drive if parking is full there.

• Watch out for pedestrians and bicyclists if you are driving.

• Stay on trails and avoid walking in the road.

• Put your pass in your pocket. Don't leave your park pass or receipt in a hotel room or at home.

• Ride your bike on the road or the Pa'rus Trail. Bicycling is not allowed on any other trails in the park. If you are riding in the road, you must stop to let buses pass you.

• The NPS may temporarily close roads if traffic is congested or there is nowhere for drivers to park.

• In general, fewer people visit Zion on weekdays than weekends. Consider arriving early or after 3 PM to avoid the busiest times of day.

Plan ahead and prepare

If you cannot park in Zion or if all of our campsites are full, research nearby communities and public lands to learn about other recreational activities and lodging. Always recreate responsibly and respect private owners' property and facilities.


Follow Leave No Trace practices everywhere in the park and beyond; be sure to pack out all your trash.



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


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Zion Canyon Shuttle Map

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ANASAZI STATE PARK MUSEUM - This ancient Indian village in the heart of Utah's canyon country was one of the largest Anasazi communities west of the Colorado River. The site is believed to have been occupied from A.D. 1050 to 1200. The village remains largely unexcavated, but many artifacts have been uncovered and are on display in the newly remodeled museum. Anasazi State Park is in the picturesque town of Boulder on State Route 12. Group and individual picnic areas are available. There is no camping. (435) 335-7308.

BAKER - Baker Reservoir is a small lake on the Santa Clara River four miles north of Veyo on Utah State Route 18. It is a 63-acre lake with an average depth of about 20 feet. Many people come to the reservoir to camp at one of its 10 campsites and to fish. The reservoir is stocked with rainbow trout and contains brown trout, green sunfish, crayfish, redbreast shiner, and mountain sucker. It has picnic areas and vault toilets. There is a fee for visiting the reservoir and no boat ramp.

BRYCE CANYON - Bryce Canyon National Park is a scientist's laboratory and a child's playground. Because Bryce transcends 2,000 feet of elevation, the park exists in three distinct climatic zones: spruce/fir forest, ponderosa pine forest and pinion pine/juniper forest. This diversity of habitat provides for high biodiversity. Here at Bryce, you can enjoy over 100 species of birds, dozens of mammals, and more than a thousand plant species. (435) 834-5322.

CEDAR BREAKS - Sitting at over 10,000 feet and looking down into a half-mile deep geologic amphitheater. Come wander among timeless bristlecone pines, stand in lush meadows of wildflowers, ponder crystal-clear night skies and experience the richness of our subalpine forest. Just four miles off Utah Highway 148, you'll find the Cedar Breaks National Monument parking lot.



CORAL PINK SAND DUNES - At an elevation of 6,000 feet and 12 paved miles off U.S. Highway 89 near Kanab, this park provides a fantastic setting for camping, hiking, OHV riding or just playing in the sand. A 265-acre conservation area prohibits motorized vehicles in order to protect the Coral Pink beetle (found nowhere else in the world) and its habitat. The mule deer, jackrabbit, kit fox, coyote, and many small rodents also make the park their home. (435) 648-2800.

DEAD HORSE POINT - Dead Horse Point State Park is perhaps Utah's most spectacular state park. Dead Horse Point is a promontory of stone surrounded by steep cliffs near Moab. The overlook at Dead Horse Point is 6,000 feet above sea level. Two-thousand feet below, the Colorado River winds its way from the continental divide in Colorado

to the Gulf of California, a distance of 1,400 miles. (435) 259-2614.

DINOSAUR TRACKS - The St. George Dinosaur Discovery Site at Johnson Farm is home to exceptionally well-preserved dinosaur tracks, some displaying skin impressions. These tracks, along with hundreds of fossil fish, plants, rare dinosaur remains, invertebrates' traces, and important sedimentary structures, show evidence that this site was produced along the western edge of a large, Early Jurassic (age between 195-198 million years ago) freshwater lake. (435) 574-3466.

ENTERPRISE - There are two reservoirs in the Bull Valley Mountains 10 miles southwest of the town of Enterprise. The main one is Upper Enterprise Reservoir, about 250 acres with an average depth of about 50 feet, while Lower Enterprise Reservoir is 79 acres. Many come to the reservoir to camp, fish hike, and boat. The Honeycomb Campground



is situated between both lakes and has 21 campsites and flush toilets. There is a boat ramp on Upper Enterprise Reservoir and several fishing areas around both reservoirs. Fishermen will find rainbow trout and smallmouth bass here. Fees are charged.

FOUR CORNERS - The Four Corners is the only place in the U.S. where four states come together at one place: Arizona, New Mexico, Utah and Colorado. Here, a person can put each of their hands and feet in four states at the same time. The unique landmark is on Navajo Nation land and is open for visits from the public. West of U.S. Highway 160, 40 miles southwest of Cortez, Colo. (928) 871-6436.

GRAND CANYON - A World Heritage Site encompassing 1,218,375 acres on the Colorado Plateau in northwestern Arizona. The land is semi-arid and consists of raised plateaus and structural basins typical of the southwestern United States. (928) 638-7888.

GRAND STAIRCASE-ESCALANTE NATIONAL MONUMENT - Nearly 1.9 million acres of America's public lands and located between Bryce Canyon and Glen Canyon Recreational Areas. From its namesake Grand Staircase of cliffs and terraces across the rugged Kaiparowits Plateau to the beauty of the Escalante River Canyons, the Monument's size, resources, and isolated location provide amazing opportunities.

GUNLOCK - In scenic red rock country, 15 miles northwest of St. George, lies the 240-acre Gunlock State Park and Reservoir where year-round boating, water sports, and quality fishing for bass and catfish attract visitors. Facilities include boat launching ramp and pit privies. (435) 628-2255.

LAKE MEAD - Lake Mead National Recreation Area offers a wealth of things to do and places to go year-round. Its huge lakes cater to boaters, swimmers, sunbathers and fishermen, while its desert rewards hikers, wildlife photographers, and roadside sightseers. It is also home to thousands of desert plants and animals adapted to survive in an extreme place where rain is scarce and temperatures soar. (702) 293-8990.

LAKE POWELL - In Glen Canyon National Recreation Area is one of the world's great places for houseboating! The 186-mile-long lake offers sandy beaches, cool blue water, and exceptional red-rock scenery. It is excellent for boating, skiing, kayaking, and fishing. Boat or hike to Rainbow Bridge, or explore any of its many canyons or sand dunes. (928) 608-6200.

PINE VALLEY - Pine Valley Reservoir is a beautiful place for fishermen to fish brook trout and rainbow trout. The reservoir is near the Pine Valley Recreation Complex, which has over 150 campsites with picnic and restroom facilities. This area is greener than most other parts of southwestern Utah with pine and pinion trees, and many come to enjoy camping and hiking. It is west of the town of Central. (435) 652-3100.

QUAIL LAKE - Quail Creek State Park provides excellent year-round camping, picnicking, boating, and trout and bass fishing in sunny southwest Utah. The park is three miles east of the Interstate 15 Hurricane exit on Utah State Route 9. Facilities include 23 campsites, modern restrooms, a fish cleaning station, and two covered group-use pavilions. (435) 879-2378.

SAND HOLLOW - Looking to fish? Swim? Ride your ATV in the sand? Do all that and more at Sand Hollow State Park, located between St. George and Hurricane. Bring your boat, a picnic, and some fishing gear for a fun day on the reservoir, or watch the kids swim while you relax on the beach. Load up your RV or tent and settle in for a nice campout, or ride your ATV in the dunes of Sand Mountain. (435) 680-0715.




SNOW CANYON - Named after early Utah leaders Lorenzo and Erastus Snow, Snow Canyon State Park begins just outside of Ivins and stretches northward. Spectacular scenery includes towering red and white sandstone cliffs, black lava formations, and even a waterfall that appears during heavy rain. Snow Canyon offers 16 miles of hiking trails, beautiful sand dunes, technical rock climbing sites, horseback riding, year-round camping, nature studies, and wildlife viewing. This park is a favorite for locals and visitors alike. (435) 628-2255.

ZION - With breathtaking views, numerous hiking attractions of all difficulty levels and some of the most spectacular scenery on earth, Zion National Park and its surrounding areas attract thousands of visitors every year. This natural wonder is not only a mecca of recreational activity, but Zion and nearby Springdale host numerous cultural activities, as well. There's something for everyone in Zion - whether you're looking for a challenging hike or a fun excursion for the family. (435) 772-3256.



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




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Greater Southern Utah & Zion Area Map

From art festivals and outdoor concerts to rodeos, parades, and film screenings, there's something happening in every season. Here are just a few highlights. Be sure to check out *The Independent's* extensive Events Calendar and local event coverage in every issue!

January

Winter 4x4 Jamboree (Hurricane/Sand Hollow) – One of the biggest off-road events in Southern Utah during the winter season, attracting enthusiasts from across the West.

February

St. George Parade of Homes (Washington County) – Showcasing luxury and custom homes with a focus on design, architecture, and interior inspiration. Bryce Canyon Winter Festival (Bryce Canyon National Park) – Presidents' Day weekend celebration featuring snowshoeing, archery, arts and crafts, and more. The Annual Sears Invitational – Every year on President's Day weekend, showcasing over 100 artists from all over the West and more than 200 traditional, contemporary, and sculptural pieces of artwork.

March

Southern Utah Early Music Festival (St. George) – Hosted by Utah Tech University, this concert explores early music traditions from Gregorian chant to the Baroque. Ivins Fitness Fest (Ivins) – A health-forward community event with fitness booths and the kickoff to the month-long "Sloth-A-Thlon."

April

Kayenta Chalk Festival (Ivins) – A vibrant celebration of ephemeral art, where local and visiting artists transform the sidewalks

of the Kayenta Art Village with large-scale chalk creations. St. George Art Festival (St. George) – Held Easter weekend in historic downtown, this beloved festival features fine art, live music, and local food vendors. St. George Plein Air Festival (St. George) – Now in its fifth year, this outdoor painting festival draws artists of all levels to capture the beauty of Southern Utah landscapes on canvas. Includes workshops, exhibitions, and live painting events. Art Around the Corner Unveiling (St. George) – Each spring, the annual Outdoor Sculpture Exhibit kicks off with a celebratory unveiling of new public art installations throughout downtown. Zion Chalk & Earth Fest (Springdale) – This interactive art and nature festival combines chalk art, earth-based installations, and hands-on activities along the gateway to Zion National Park.

May

Spring Fiesta (Cedar City) – A lively cultural celebration featuring music, food, and family fun in historic downtown Cedar. Amazing Earthfest (Kanab) – Southern Utah's signature festival of learning, arts, culture, and outdoor adventure. Kanab Outdoor Market (Kanab) – A weekly market running through October, offering nursery stock, baked goods, local art, jewelry, crafts, and a bounce house for kids.

June

Jacob Hamblin Days Festival (Kanab/Kane County) – Honoring the region's pioneer and Western heritage with family-friendly festivities. Maynard Dixon Country Campout (Mt. Carmel, Kane County) – A multi-day gathering of artists and fans of Western art history and painting. Utah Shakespeare Festival (Cedar City) – Kicks off in late June and runs through October with a celebrated

lineup of Shakespearean and contemporary plays.

June–July

Firefly Powerbike Rally (Toquerville or Hurricane area) – Electric dirt-bike gathering with rides, demos, and social events for e-bike enthusiasts.

July

Independence Day Festivities (Various towns in Southern Utah) – Parades, fireworks, barbecues, and live music in communities like Kanab, Springdale, Duck Creek, and more. Pioneer Day Celebrations (Various towns in Southern Utah) – Celebrations on or around July 24th honoring Utah's pioneer history with parades, games, dinners, and traditional festivities.

August

Kane County Fair (Orderville) – A family-friendly event offering games, contests, food, and community fun with mostly free admission. Legend's Weekend (Kanab) – A celebration of Kanab's Western and film heritage featuring parades, rodeos, film screenings, concerts, and more.

September

Red Rock Film Festival (Cedar City) – Independent film screenings, workshops, and panels celebrating artistic and innovative filmmaking. Carmel Mountain Music & Art Festival and Car Show (Mount Carmel, Kane County) – Classic cars, live music, food vendors, and kid-friendly activities. Duck Creek End of Summer Bash (Duck Creek Village, Kane County) – Labor Day Weekend music event at Duck on In Saloon. Zion Canyon Music Festival (Springdale) – A fall tradition in Zion Canyon with live music, artisan booths, food, and local flair. Swiss Days (Santa Clara) – A lively heritage celebration

with Swiss-inspired food, vendors, live music, and community activities. Hurricane Peach Days (Hurricane) – Parade, rodeo, carnival, and of course, peaches – held the weekend after Labor Day. Escalante Canyons Art Festival (Escalante) – Featuring plein air competitions, art exhibits, guided hikes, and workshops celebrating art and landscape.

October

Kanab Arts Festival (Kanab) – Art, food, live music, poetry, wagon rides, and kids' activities line Kanab's main street in a festive fall atmosphere. Zion Rocktoberfest (Springdale) – A mix of live music, food, beer, and Oktoberfest-inspired celebration set against the red cliffs of Zion. Red Bull Rampage (Virgin) – The world's premier freeride mountain biking event, drawing top athletes and huge crowds to Southern Utah.

November

Butch Cassidy 10K Run (Springdale/Virgin/Grafton area) – A scenic road race through red rock country followed by a celebratory gathering in historic Grafton. K-town Turkey Trot 5K (Kanab) – A Thanksgiving morning fun run/walk for all ages in downtown Kanab. Plein Air Art Invitational (Springdale) – A week of exhibits, workshops, and painting sales with some of the finest plein air artists in the nation. Christmas Light Parade and Festival (Kanab) – Parade, gourmet s'mores, hot cocoa, caroling, and a lantern launch held the Saturday after Thanksgiving. Zion Canyon Arts and Crafts Fair (Springdale) – A beloved community tradition featuring local and regional artisan booths and handmade goods.

December

Z-Arts Gala (Springdale) – A formal night of celebration with food, dancing, and an art auction hosted by Z-Arts.

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
